

Embracing Earth Month All Year

The City has long been a pioneer among municipal governments in adopting environmentally sustainable practices. For Tallahassee, sustainability is our community's ability to meet present and future needs through the proper stewardship of environmental, economic and social resources. The City's efforts span across every department and include many community partners. Below are highlights of several programs. Learn more at Talgov.com/Sustainability.

A few years ago, the City committed to transition Tallahassee to a 100 percent net clean, renewable energy future by 2050, with milestone markers along the way. To achieve this bold goal, a plan is being developed in collaboration with local residents and organizations to guide these long-term efforts.

Creating greener transportation options is part of that goal. To that end, StarMetro is actively converting its fleet to all-electric, with roughly one-third of its buses currently transitioned. The Fleet department also maintains a biodiesel program that turns used cooking grease donated by the community into fuel.

As the capital of the Sunshine State, the City is proud to have the largest airport-based solar farm in the world at Tallahassee International Airport. It generates 62-megawatts of solar power, which provides energy to homes, businesses and City buildings.

The City's Energy Smart PLUS (e+) program has helped residents save energy and money through rebates, grants and loans for decades. Since 2008, the City has issued more than \$30 million in incentive payments to customers through the e+ program. This has generated over 500,000 megawatt hours in customer energy savings and over \$55 million in savings on their utility bills.

Sustainability is also rooted in how we care for our environment. The City, through its Neighborhood Affairs division, routinely helps community groups organize litter cleanups and beautification projects. Through its Think About Personal Pollution (TAPP) program, the City provides education and grants to help protect local water bodies. From picking up pet waste to planting rain gardens, TAPP focuses on actionable efforts. The City also actively works to address EPA-designated brownfields, which are properties where the presence or potential presence of contamination hinders redevelopment or reuse.

Collectively these and many other sustainability programs in use by the City helped it achieve a LEED Gold certification through the U.S. Green Buildings Council's LEED for Cities and Communities. This is an international rating system that provides a framework for communities to benchmark their sustainability and resilience performance relative to peers across the globe. Tallahassee is one of just over 120 LEED-certified cities and communities in the world.
