STORE WATER FOR HURRICANE SEASON

With the 2022 hurricane season in full swing (June 1-Nov. 30), the City of Tallahassee keeps watch for possible storms and urges residents to prepare. Personal preparedness can enhance safety and ease the recovery process. A hurricane has the potential to temporarily impact water service. To guarantee your family is ready should the worst occur, drinking water is one of the most important items to have in your preparedness supplies.

Use these tips to ensure you have enough safe water during a disaster.

- Store-bought bottled water is not your only option. You can fill containers from your tap, which helps save money. Be sure you wash and rinse containers before filling.
- Store enough water to last at least three days. (Figure that each person in the house needs at least one gallon per day. People with special needs, such as nursing mothers, infants and family members with illnesses, will require more.)
- Store water in high-quality plastic rather than glass containers, which can break, or paper cartons, which weaken over time.
- If you have advanced warning of a disaster, fill sinks, bathtubs and all available containers with water.

STUDENTS RIDING STARMETRO

It's time for a new school year. If your K-12 student is interested in riding the City bus to school, sign them up for StarMetro's Student Transportation for Academics and Responsibilities (STAR) Program, which allows them to ride for free. All students participating in the STAR Program must have a STAR Program Card and current signed agreement on file. With these items, students in grades 6-12 can ride StarMetro unaccompanied; students in kindergarten through fifth grade must be accompanied by a sixth grade or older sibling, legal guardian or parental designee.
